SUBJECT: PSiRA PROFESSIONAL BODY RECOGNITION BY SAQA

This communiqué serves to inform the industry of the application process that the Authority (PSiRA) has followed through with the South African Qualifications Authority (SAQA) for Recognition as Professional Body, as per SAQA's Criteria for Recognising a Professional Body and Registering a Professional Designation for the Purposes of the National Qualifications Framework Act, Act 67 of 2008.

The Authority's mandate:

PSiRA's primary objective is to regulate the private security industry and to exercise effective control over the practice of the occupation of the security service provider in the public and national interest and the interest of the private security industry itself.

In terms of the Section 4 (k) of the PSiR Act, the Authority's functions is to take necessary steps that may be expedient or necessary in connection with the training of

security service providers and prospective security service providers to ensure a high quality of training and in particular with regard to:

- (i) the accreditation and withdrawal of the accreditation of persons and institutions;
- (ii) the monitoring and auditing of the quality of training functions performed by accredited persons;
- (iii) the participation in the activities of other bodies and persons entitled by law to set standards in respect of training of security service providers or bodies entitled to formulate, implement or monitor skills development plans for the private security industry;
- (iv) the appointment of persons to monitor and assess achievements or outcomes in respect of standards applicable to training;
- (v) the determination and accreditation of qualifications required by security service providers to perform particular types of security services, and
- (vi) the taking of reasonable steps to verify the authenticity of training certificates presented by the persons for the purpose of this Act.

In pursuant to this mandate, the Authority has published the Draft Training Regulation dated 24 June 2016, Government Gazette No. 756. These Draft Training Regulations are aimed at determining the statutory minimum training standards for different classes and categories of private security industry which are aligned to National Qualifications Framework (NQF), soon to be revised in terms of the Occupational Qualifications Sub-Framework. The proposed skills programmes as published in the abovementioned Government Gazette will be going through the realignment to occupational qualifications.

It is important to note that the private security industry comprises of more than twenty (20) disciplines/sectors and some are listed in **Table1** below. The following are some of the designations informed by skills programmes clusters derived from the unit standards based qualifications which will soon be obsolete.

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Although the skills programmes are not promulgated, the Authority together with SAQA has decided to register only one designation for the purpose of completing the first phase of PSiRA Professional Body application (more designations will be registered at the later stage). In the meantime, this will allow the Authority together with the industry to undertake the necessary re-alignment of the occupational qualification/part qualifications for the various classes and categories of private security. **The table below is the recommended skills programme.**
